Naloxone is a safe, fast acting, nasal spray that temporarily reverses an opioid overdose.



Suspect an Overdose? Always call 9-1-1

The Good Samaritan Law protects both the person overdosing and the person who calls 9-1-1 for assistance from unwarranted legal consequences related to drug paraphernalia found on scene.

It does not protect people with outstanding warrants*

Over 93,000 people died of a drug overdose in 2020. Anyone can overdose, anyone can save a life.

There are 4 types of naloxone.



Narcan Nasal Spray is the most widely available, and easiest to use form of Naloxone.

What is Naloxone?

Naloxone (Narcan) is a medication used to reverse an Opioid Overdose. When taken in excess, opioids reduce the body's ability to breathe. Naloxone works quickly to block the effects of the opioid. Naloxone is harmless if administered in error to someone who is not experiencing an opioid overdose.

What is an opioid?

Opioids, or opium, is a drug that is naturally derived from the poppy plant. It works to reduce, and even eliminate pain by blocking pain signals between the brain and the body.

Common opioids that you might be familiar with include, but are not limited to:

- Prescription Opioids often received from a doctor: Vicodin, Oxy, Morphine, etc.
- Heroin
- Fentanyl

Fentanyl:

Fentanyl is a synthetic opioid that is 50-100x stronger than morphine. Fentanyl was involved in **85% of CT's 1,378 fatal overdoses** in 2020.

Fentanyl is being **mixed into most street drugs**, including counterfeit pills. **Remember:**start low & go slow, never use alone, always
have naloxone nearby & test your product
using fentanyl test strips before using.
